## Notes from Village Hall

**BRUSH AND METAL PICKUP:** Pickup from November through February is available by appointment on Fridays only. Call Village Hall at 716-632-4120 to arrange a pickup.

GARDEN AND YARD WASTE: Please note that garden and yard waste is picked up by Modern Disposal on regular garbage days from April through November. Waste must be placed in paper bags or open containers for pick up before 7

a.m. Do not use a garbage or recycling tote. Containers may not weigh over 60 lbs.

SNOW CLEARING REMINDERS: Snow may not be deposited onto any public street or alley from any private driveway. Piling of snow must also not prevent access to any fire hydrant or sidewalk. Additionally, all hydrants and sidewalks must be cleared from any snow accumulation.

## Nature Play opens to community

Nature Play is located on the park's northwestern edge and will now be available for special programs and events to be held.

The Village of Williamsville on Aug. 28, officially introduced to the community Nature Play at Glen Park, a newly-created outdoor space to engage children and families within the serene setting of the park.

Nature Play is located on the park's northwestern edge near Noll Nature Center off Glen Avenue.

The space, which includes a unique amphitheater, is constructed of a variety of all-natural materials, such as large tree limbs, rocks and wood. The space will serve as a gathering place for the community to learn about the special ecological features within the park and village and for children to use their imaginations among nature.

Construction of Nature Play was pioneered by the village's Department of Public Works and designed by its crew chief, Ben Vilonen, following input from community stakeholders and a steering committee.

In addition to the amphitheater, Nature Play at Glen Park features include a balance beam log, trees and boulders for climbing, and tables and chairs created from logs and stumps.

Plans for Nature Play at Glen Park were initiated in 2017 when Rogers was a village board trustee.

"Village resident Dave Bauer called and asked to meet and discuss an idea he had," Rogers said. "He presented the idea of creating a nature play area somewhere in the village. As trustee, one of my roles was liaison to the Glen Park Join Board. Nature play appeared to be the perfect companion for the already passive atmosphere at Glen Park."

After discussing his ideas with Rogers, she and Bauer teamed with a group of advocates to create the steering committee that was tasked with further developing the project.

Rogers added that she would like to continue to incorporating features into Nature Play at Glen Park, possibly by planting willow trees and erecting an entrance sign.

THE TREE LIGHTING: Village officials are planning Williamsville's annual tree lighting ceremony and reception, set for 6 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 7, in front of Village Hall, 5565 Main St. The tree lighting and its reception are being held in cooperation with the Williamsville Business Association's annual Holiday in the Village event, which will feature activities for children and adults, including an appearance by Santa Claus at the Williamsville Library. **PARKING BAN:** Beginning Friday, Nov. 1, the standing or parking of vehicles is prohibited on all streets within the Village of Williamsville from 1 a.m. to 7 a.m. each night. The ban is in place to allow for snow clearing and road salting. The ban will be in effect until Monday, April 1, 2019, unless otherwise determined by the Village Board.



SNOW AND HYDRANTS: As we move toward the end of autumn, the chances for our region to receive snow increase. Residents and business owners are reminded to clear snow away from fire hydrants that are in front of their properties. Fire department officials suggest keeping at least a 3-foot radius clear of snow around the hydrant.
